TRANSITION FORUM AT BAARC

On June 13, young people and their parents heard a panel of speakers explain the transition process from school to adult services.

- Beth Moran Liuzzo, DDS Brockton Area Director, and Mary Beth Finneran, the DDS Brockton Area Transition Service Coordinator, provided information about the Chapter 688 referral to adult services, DDS eligibility and prioritization for adult services, and the range of services offered to eligible adults.
- Vanessa Sullivan, Senior Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor for the Brockton Area office of the Mass. Rehabilitation Commission, spoke about MRC eligibility and services for adults.
- Rob Biela, Employment and Community-Based Day Services Director at BAArc, explained how the state's Employment First Initiative has resulted in more opportunities for competitive employment for adults with disabilities.

As an example, participants learned how BAArc is providing job training and job development services for individuals referred by DDS.

Exceptional Lives

Exceptional Lives recently launched its free, user-friendly Disability Resource Directory, a searchable online database of disability programs and providers in Massachusetts. It contains more than 1,200 resources in 54 service categories in areas such as:

- Therapy (including speech, PT, OT, and ABA providers)
- Education
- Employment (including transition & vocational programs)
- Medical & clinical
- Adult programs (including housing & transportation services)
- Parent & caregiver support
- Legal help
- Social & recreational (including after-school programs & summer camps)
- Sibling support, family grants, and more.

The Resource Directory is designed for parents, caregivers, and professionals. Users can search for services by zip code, age group, disability type, if it is covered by MassHealth, and whether a facility is wheelchair-accessible. Each search produces a printable resource list and a visual resource map displaying options in a person's local area.

The Directory is an updated and redesigned version of a resource database previously managed by the nonprofit Autism Consortium, whose resource specialists used it to connect families to relevant resources. The resource specialists served families in Massachusetts hospitals including Boston Children's Hospital, Mass General Hospital's Lurie Center, Tufts Floating Hospital for Children, Boston Medical Center, and UMass Memorial in Worcester.

ABLE Accounts: In Massachusetts, the ABLE Savings Plan is now offered by MEFA and managed by Fidelity. It is called "AttainABLE." ABLE accounts are taxadvantaged saving accounts for individuals with disabilities. ABLE accounts are a financial planning tool that allows individuals with disabilities to establish savings accounts that will not affect their eligibility for SSI, MassHealth and other public benefits.

The ABLE Act limits eligibility to individuals with significant disabilities with and age of onset of disability before turning 26 years of age. You do not need to establish the ABLE account before age 26, but the disability onset must be before the 26th birthday. An individual can only have one ABLE account, although many people, such as parents and grandparents, can contribute to the account. The total annual contributions by all contributors in a single tax year is \$14,000. For SSI recipients, the ABLE Act exempts the first \$100,000 from the SSI \$2000 individual resource limit. However, if the account exceeds \$100,000, the beneficiary's SSI cash benefit would be suspended until the account falls back below \$100,000. There is no similar limitation on Medicaid benefits. However, depending on the state in which the beneficiary resides, there may be a "Medicaid Pay-Back" provision that would go into effect when the beneficiary dies.

Expenses allowed by ABLE accounts are described as a "qualified disability expense." This is any expense related to the designated beneficiary as a result of living a life with disabilities. This may include education, housing, transportation, employment training and support, assistive technology, personal support services, health care expenses, financial management and administrative services and other expenses, which help improve health, independence, and/or quality of life.

Brockton Area Arc To Pilot a Program Designed to Increase Siblings' Involvement in Future

Planning: BAArc is recruiting 6 adults who have brothers or sisters with autism spectrum disorder to participate in an individualized support and planning process in the fall. A trained facilitator, under the guidance of researchers clinicians from Boston University, will assist adult siblings to understand the service delivery system, help their brother or sister to develop a vision for the future, and to advocate for that sibling.

Parent Consultant Training Institute: The Federation for Children with Special Needs offers this specialized training at various locations in Massachusetts. In the Spring of 2018, the training will be offered in Brockton.

The PCTI is an intensive training program designed to provide parents and professionals with a solid foundation in special education laws, procedures, and related subjects. The training consists of 40-54 hours of classroom instruction including, among others, the following topics:

- IDEA and MGLc 71B legislative history
- Special Education advocacy and implementation of the law
- Writing Measurable IEP Goals
- Effective Progress and Hot Topics
- Neuropsychological Evaluations
- Academic Evaluations

- Introduction to the Transition Planning Process
- Transition Assessments
- Section 504
- Families and Culture
- Effective Communication
- Problem Resolution Service (PRS) Complaints
- Mediation
- BSEA Appeals

Presenters include Federation staff, attorneys, and experts in the field of special education, representatives from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) and the Bureau of Special Education Appeals (BSEA), among others.
